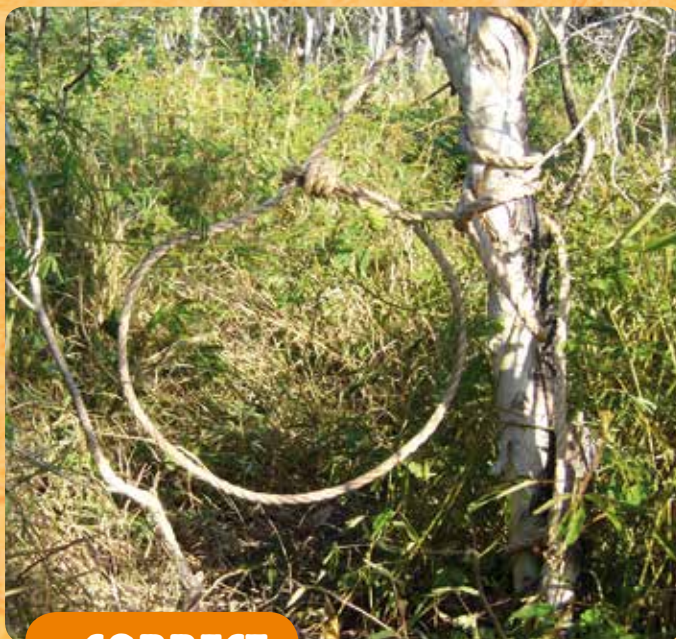


Correct or wrong ?



> **WRONG**

Noose too large



> **CORRECT**

Noose small enough
to capture only the head

Materials

Rope

- Diameter : 8mm
- Length : 4m
- Any colour



COST

→ **Less than US\$ 2 / snare**

How to use the snare ?

Check the snare:

- Twice per week
- Without a dog
- From a distance

Rope snare

LIGHT - SIMPLE - INEXPENSIVE



Effective everywhere day and night

1 Making the snare

1 Make a slip knot at each end



2 The noose

> Must

close without resistance

> Musn't

open when the animal stops pulling on the snare



2 Where to set the snare ?

- On paths frequently used by pigs
- On paths not frequented by people
- On narrow paths (between 2 trees if possible)
- On densely vegetated paths
- Close to a tree

3 When setting the snare do not :

- Cut any vegetation
- Have any dogs around
- Leave any sign of your presence (e.g. cigarette butts, urine...)

1 Secure the snare to a solid tree



After capture, to easily untie the snare, insert a baton in the slip knot

2 Suspend the noose at 20 cm off the ground (one hand height)

NOTE

if terrain is steep: set the bottom of the noose just off the ground



3 To hold the noose in place

Use materials that are :

- **natural** (vegetation)
- **easy to break**

> Option 1

Attached directly to vegetation



> Option 2

Attached to support sticks
